The concept of 'face' is assumed to have originated in Chinese (see, for example, Bargiela-Chiappini 2003: 1454) and although it has been brought to the attention of the west mainly through Goffman's (1972 [1955]) seminal essay 'On face-work', it is Brown and Levinson's (1978, 1987) theory of politeness which has popularised it.
